

I'm pleased to share this look back on the 2022-23 Season, and all we accomplished this past year.

This is a time of change — in the arts and in the world — and Meany embraced the challenge, taking chances on new voices, new works, and new perspectives. What didn't change is our commitment to serving our campus and our community by championing live performing arts that inspire and connect us.

Leading choreographer Bill T. Jones joined Meany as our first guest Artistic Partner, with *Becoming: At Home in the World*, based on his deep interest in what it takes to be a well-rounded citizen of the world. Bill curated five cutting edge artists that radically broadened the scope of our programming and were inclusive and unapologetic in their call for social justice.

We fulfilled our promise to reschedule the innovative artists we had to cancel in the 2019-20 and 2020-21 Seasons: Ragamala Dance Company, Camille A. Brown and Dancers, Step Afrika!, Cuarteto Latinoamericano and Strings for Peace.

Most importantly, we connected even more deeply with *you*, and we are so grateful for everything you made possible last season — and every season. Thank you for your support and for being an integral part of the Meany family.

On the MEANY STAGE

Twenty-six leading artists and ensembles graced the Meany Stage in the 2022–23 Season, including five exceptional performances curated by Bill T. Jones as part of a special series, *Becoming: At Home in the World*.

ROBYN ORLIN

South African choreographer Robyn Orlin's *And so you see... our honourable blue sky and ever enduring sun... can only be consumed slice by slice...* highlighted the uneasy relationship between global north and south — and won performer Albert Ibokwe Khoza a Bessie Award.

GABRIEL KAHANE

For two years, Gabriel Kahane worked on a new project, commissioned by Meany, that was inspired by a year spent away from the internet. He presented the finished project, *Magnificent Bird*, in November.

CUARTETO LATINOAMERICANO

Mexico: A Musical Journey explored Mexican history and culture through music by six iconic Latin American composers and works by visual artists ranging from Frida Kahlo and Diego Rivera to today.

PILOBOLUS

Meany Center was an appropriate venue for *BIG 5-0*, celebrating Pilobolus's 50th anniversary: the company was originally founded by university students interested in the intersections between science, art, movement and the natural world.

ABBY Z & THE NEW UTILITY

Abby Z's choreography shatters assumptions of established forms. We presented this performance in the intimate Studio Theatre where audiences experienced the dancers' kinetic energy up close.



DOVER QUARTET

DANIIL TRIFONOV

Since we first presented him in 2013, Daniil Trifonov has established himself as one of the most musically advanced pianists of his generation. It was meaningful to welcome him back to our stage ten years later.

SŌ PERCUSSION AND CAROLINE SHAW

Composer/vocalist Caroline Shaw's extended vocal techniques and powerful lyrics combined with Sō's experimental percussion effects on *Let the Soil Play Its Simple Part* made this performance spellbinding.

JUILLIARD STRING QUARTET

It was enormously exciting to present a program of Beethoven Quartets alongside two new pieces (co-commissioned by Meany Center) by German composer, conductor and clarinetist Jörg Widmann that were based on Beethoven's writing.

MARTHA GRAHAM DANCE COMPANY

In *Canticle for Innocent Comedians*, a reimagining of a lost work by Martha Graham, eight diverse choreographers created new vignettes based on Graham's original theme that celebrated different aspects of nature.

EMERSON QUARTET

After 44 years (and a record 27 performances at Meany!), Phil Setzer, Eugene Drucker, Lawrence Dutton and Paul Watkins are retiring the Emerson. Their final performance on the Meany Stage moved us to tears.

HOLLAND ANDREWS

A vocalist, composer and performance artist who explores the abstraction of operatic and extended vocal technique to build multi-layered soundscapes, Holland performed their solo program in the intimate Studio Theatre.

BEHZOD ABDURAIMOV

We've been following Uzbek pianist Behzod Abduraimov for several years as his career has grown. His well-received Meany debut featured work by fellow Uzbek composer Dilorom Saidaminova, alongside Rachmaninoff and Prokofiev.

KODŌ

Beloved by Meany audiences, KODŌ returned to our stage — and shook our walls! — with their expert musicianship and amazing physicality. The audience's joy was palpable in the packed theater.

TAKAČS QUARTET

Known for their innovative programming, the Takačs is one of the world's leading quartets. Their January performance featured works by Fanny Mendelssohn, Benjamin Britten and Antonín Dvořák.

RAGAMALA DANCE COMPANY

Meany Center was a proud commissioner of the stunningly beautiful *The Fires of Varanasi*. Contemporary Bharatanatyam-style dance performed to live music created a diasporic work that spoke to our time.

CAMILLE A. BROWN AND DANCERS

With blackboard visuals recreated each night, and the percussive music of the dancers' feet, *Black Girl: Linguistic Play* explored social dance and play as expressions of young female self-actualization in a unique and joyful experience.


ANGELA HEWITT

STRINGS FOR PEACE

Sharon Isbin is one of the most acclaimed guitarists of our time, while Amjad Ali Khan and his sons Amman Ali Bangash and Ayana Ali Bangash are known as "the first family of the sarod." Together, their unique blend of Spanish guitar and original Indian ragas was unforgettable.

THE MOTHERBOARD SUITE

Directed by Bill T. Jones and performed by Saul Williams with several musical collaborators, *The Motherboard Suite* featured dance by seven diverse choreographers — including local choreographer Jade Solomon Curtis — and fearlessly explored the intersection of race and technology.

THE DOVER QUARTET

Dynamic young musicians who understand the importance of diversifying the classical music repertoire, the Dover Quartet made their Meany debut with an eclectic program of Amy Beach, Antonín Dvořák and George Walker.

FATOUMATA DIAWARA

One of Africa's most vital stars, Fatoumata Diawara's propulsive blend of Southern Mali's traditional music with soul, R&B and funk had our audience dancing in the aisles.

STEP AFRIKA!

Meany co-commissioned *Drumfolk*, a powerful depiction of the 1739 Stono Rebellion through the lens of percussive dance, vocals and scenic design. Step Afrika! also performed to a packed and enthusiastic K-12 matinee.

AARON DIEHL

We hope this was just the beginning of Meany's relationship with Aaron, whose program featured works by Black American composers Margaret Bonds, Mary Lou Williams, William Grant Still, Florence Price and Duke Ellington.

THE LOS ANGELES MASTER CHORALE

Directed by Peter Sellars and sung by the exquisite Los Angeles Master Chorale, the performance of Orlando di Lasso's renaissance masterpiece *Lagrima di San Pietro* fully embodied the music to stunning effect.

RUBBERBAND

RUBBERBAND made its Meany debut with choreographer and company founder Victor Quijada's *Reckless Underdog*. Quijada's propulsive blend of classical ballet, modern dance and hip hop defies categorization.

DANIEL ALEXANDER JONES

We ended our season with *I Choose to Remember Us Whole*, an interactive experience that highlighted Daniel Alexander Jones's commitment to civic healing through collective engagement.

In 2022, we launched a new initiative: each year we would invite a leading artist to join us in programming a Meany season, bringing new perspectives.

Inviting New Perspectives

For our first Artistic Partner, we enlisted choreographer Bill T. Jones to help curate the 2022–23 Season in partnership with New York Live Arts.

Bill gave us an opportunity to take chances on work that was challenging in both form and content and expanded Meany’s aesthetic reach. The artists he chose — South African choreographer Robyn Orlin and performer Albert Ibokwe Khoza; choreographer Abby Z and her company the New Utility; singer, songwriter and filmmaker Saul Williams; vocalist Holland Andrews; and artist, playwright and performance artist Daniel Alexander Jones — reflected Bill’s fierce engagement with the issues of our times and his commitment to showcasing artists whose work is unapologetic in its call for justice.

The result, *Becoming: At Home in the World*, broke exciting new ground at Meany, introduced artists and art forms that seldom appear at venues like ours, and increased our engagement with new partners and communities across Seattle, and with faculty and students on campus.

During the 2022-23 Season, Meany accelerated our use of digital platforms to deepen audience awareness and engagement.

Increasing Our Reach

In February, we hired a new digital marketing manager who re-purposed existing video for social channels, as well as creating a steady stream of new and exciting content to keep our social media fresh. The results were impressive: a doubling of Instagram followers; a 26% increase in engagement across all channels; and a 501% increase in video views over last year.

To deepen engagement, we selected several productions whose audiences would benefit from a greater understanding of background and context and interviewed artists and experts about the work.

Audience members who had seen our interview with Grant Gershon and Peter Sellars before attending the Los Angeles Master Chorale's performance of *Lagrima di San Pietro* understood how fiendishly difficult that performance was. Professor Catherine Cole's discussion of South African performance art during Apartheid provided critical context for Robyn Orlin's *And so you see... our honourable blue sky and ever enduring sun... can only be consumed slice by slice...* performed by Albert Ibokwe Khoza.

Artist fees pay only for the time an artist is performing on the stage. Commissions help cover the many hours of creative labor — dreaming, taking risks and experimenting — artists put into developing new work.

Investing in Artists

Supporting artists' creative process is one of the most important things we do. In the 2022–23 Season, Meany Center co-commissioned five new works in dance and music.

Step Afrika!'s percussive new work, *Drumfolk*, was a visceral depiction of the 1739 Stono Rebellion, the largest uprising of enslaved people in the Southern states, and its impact on Black lives and Black culture through the present day.

Ragamala Dance Company is committed to the idea that while history is time bound, the stories we share are timeless. Meany both co-commissioned and presented the world premiere of their latest work, *Fires of Viranasi*, an immersive ritual for the stage where time is suspended and humans merge with the divine.

In music, we commissioned two new chamber pieces by the multifaceted German composer Jörg Widmann for the Juilliard Quartet, as well as a slate of new songs by American composer and singer-songwriter Gabriel Kahane for his latest album, *Magnificent Bird*.

So much of what Meany does on our stage and in the community wouldn't be possible without collaboration with, and support of, our many partners off campus and on.

Partnering for Impact

Becoming: At Home in the World was the result of our partnership with Bill T. Jones and New York Live Arts. It was also remarkable for the breadth of connections it created, both on campus and in the community. For example, Berette Macaulay, founder of the Black Cinema Collective, partnered with the UW's Simpson Center and Northwest Film Forum to screen Saul Williams's film *Neptune Frost* the week before we presented *The Motherboard Suite*. She also moderated *Motherboard's* post-show Q&A.

On campus, individual faculty members provided critical support. Professor Jasmine Mahmoud moderated a post-show Q&A with artists Robyn Orlin and Albert Ibokwe Khoza, while professors Juliette Mains and Diana Garcia-Snyder developed a one-credit dance course connected to Daniel Alexander Jones's *I Choose to Remember Us Whole*, which the Henry Art Gallery co-presented.



Although Meany Center's mission is to present touring artists on our stage, we are deeply committed to supporting local artists.

Think Globally, Act Locally

In 2022–23, Bill T. Jones was looking for a Seattle choreographer to create new work for *The Motherboard Suite*, a multi-media performance directed by Bill and written and performed by slam-poet-turned-musician Saul Williams, with dance by six distinguished choreographers. As the show toured the country, Bill wanted to invite local choreographers to create a seventh piece to be performed in their hometown.

For *The Motherboard Suite's* West Coast premiere here at Meany, we commissioned choreographer and dancer Jade Solomon Curtis to create a new work exploring Williams's take on the intersection of technology and race. The commission not only provided financial support for Jade, it came at a time in her life when she needed a morale boost. Coming when it did, she says, was "a reminder from the universe telling me, 'Hey, Jade, your voice, your vessel is important, and you need to be here.'"


Also this year, with support from the College of Arts and Sciences, Meany continues to support 16 other local artists — who are also UW faculty — through our Creative Research Fellowship program.

Sō Educational!

On November 10, 2022, Sō Percussion performed on our stage with composer and vocalist Caroline Shaw. After the intermission, 18 UW percussion and voice students joined the professional musicians to perform *Amid the Noise* in front of an appreciative Meany audience.

Flowerpots, desk call bells, blocks of wood, spinning ratchet noisemakers and toy pianos, among other homely objects, joined steel drums, xylophones, marimbas, congas and more for twenty minutes of joyous controlled chaos. Students and quartet members moved between instruments taking up and laying down the beats as Caroline Shaw and the UW voice students contributed vocals.

UW Chair of Percussion Studies Bonnie Whiting was thrilled that her students had the rare opportunity to play with professional musicians of Sō Percussion's stature, but in a "low-stakes" environment — "Because Sō Percussion made it so much fun!" she said.


The students echoed Professor Whiting's enthusiasm.

How to invite UW students to incorporate the arts into their lives? Meany began with the idea of encouraging UW faculty to integrate the performing arts into their classroom curricula.

Inspiring the Next Generation

In 2021, Meany Center hired a full-time engagement manager with a mission to engage UW students across campus in the arts. Last season, with support from other Meany staff, the Engagement Team worked with numerous UW faculty members to pilot Arts of Course, a program which encouraged faculty to assign performances to their students as part of their coursework and students received free tickets to attend.

This past season, 472 UW students attended Meany Center through this program. And what did they think? Here are a few of the responses:

“This performance offered me an opportunity to watch/listen to music that made me think more deeply about music as a practice of social change and as a community building practice.”

“I always feel more fulfilled and ‘human’ after watching/viewing the arts. I think in this sense it increased my sense of wellbeing as a person.”

“It was a nice way to de-stress and take a break from more academic coursework.”

Meany Center's season ended with a joyful processional across campus guided by a chorus of UW dance students, faculty and community members to visit five temporary altars, each created by a remarkable local artist.

Strength in Numbers

Though the altars existed only for a day, Los Angeles-based artist Daniel Alexander Jones's project, *I Choose to Remember Us Whole*, was many months in the making.

It began in March 2022, when Daniel initially proposed a project to create temporary altars on the UW campus, each posing an existential question for participants to consider. He wanted to collaborate with Seattle artists, so Meany's Engagement Team invited Valerie Curtis-Newton, Timothy White Eagle, Leon Finley, Afroditi Psarra and Althea Rao to join the project. The group met in August and again in November and April along with staff from the Henry Art Gallery and faculty members from the School of Art + Art History + Design and the Department of Dance.

Over the ensuing months, Meany staff, artists, students, faculty and community members came together to create, activate and participate in the project. By the time the event culminated on May 20, hundreds of people had contributed their time, their art and their labor, to make *I Choose to Remember Us Whole* as great as the sum of its parts.


